Are you prepared for retirement?

Alan Northcott worked in electronics testing and assembly, but was forced to give up work when caring for his son became more challenging and his wife, Linda, was unable to manage him alone. Nicky, aged 38, has severe learning disabilities. He was born profoundly deaf, has no speech, is incontinent, epileptic, and severely autistic. In addition, Nicky has recently been diagnosed with a blood complaint which necessitates regular injections in hospital further complicating his care.

Alan and Linda are in their 60s, and in poor health themselves, with high blood pressure, angina and arthritis. They are unable to have holidays alone, because Nicky cannot be left with strangers, as he becomes very distressed and agitated, which can quickly turn to violence when he is frightened.

The charity granted a respite break to the family which enabled them to recharge their batteries and enjoy different scenery in a location that had facilities to cater for Nicky's needs. For Alan and Linda this makes all the difference to their family and has given them the respite they need to fight through another year.

Mt Kilimanjaro


What an amazing achievement to say you have climbed the tallest free standing mountain on earth with an elevation of 5,895 metres above sea level, located in Tanzania, Africa. Eight brave individuals set themselves up for the challenge of a lifetime to help one particular family who lost their father, electrician Christopher Hendrie to a rare form of cancer in just 9 weeks. Andrew Dykes, Senior Estimator of SES Engineering Services Ltd, explained to us pre-trip why he embarked on this trek "I have taken on this challenge as I know that we all sometimes need help and support through difficult times in our lives. On this occasion, the Hendrie family need the support of others to give hope to the family and create a better brighter future."

Virgin London Marathon

Melanie Dean will be running on behalf of the Electrical Industries Charity at this year's Virgin London Marathon 2017. Mel was introduced to the Electrical Industries Charity by her partner after he attended one of our fundraising events, she explained to us that "it reminded me of an incident that happened at my factory where I worked a couple of years ago. A young contractor was on site and was fatally electrocuted. He was only in his mid-20s with a young family and that family had lost their dad and husband. I remember thinking at the time how tragic it was and how I hoped the family would be supported". Mel jumped at the opportunity to help fundraise for the EIC "everyone knows about big charities but I think it is important to support the less well known charities too, particularly when they offer something unique".

Mel is a step-mother to two and a mother to a three-year-old, since having a baby Mel was motivated to start running and felt the London Marathon was the perfect goal. After running the marathon for the first time last year and becoming injured during training she is now motivated to beat her time last year "I'm very proud of myself but there is a little niggle inside saying 'you can do better'". This year she is focussing on not overdoing it "I ran the colour run in September to kick off training (see picture with strange coloured moustache). I'm doing a run/walk training plan so I minimise injury." We love Mel's life motto 'carpe diem'-seize the day, you never know what's going to happen tomorrow. So far she has fundraised £1,100 through eBay sales, cakes sales and even attending industry expos but has expressed that the final £500 will be her biggest challenge as all her family and friends have now donated.
